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STC Alberta Funded Scholarships and Award Programs

STC Alberta is committed to technical communication education at the post-secondary level. STC Alberta congratulates all the students!

History

To recognize academic excellence and encourage student involvement in our community, STC Alberta began an award system for students in Mount Royal College's Bachelor of Applied Communications in Technical Writing (now Technical Communication) program in 1997. The system awarded student memberships in STC to the students with the highest GPAs in their respective years of the program. [[Past Recipients](#)]

In 1998, STC Alberta decided to expand our support through the creation of a scholarship for a student in the second year of the program. We voted to donate \$3,000 to create an endowment fund to operate the scholarship, and applied for and were successfully awarded \$3,000 in matching funds from STC. (That matching-fund program no longer exists.) The first scholarship was awarded in February 1999. The award criteria are a combination of academic achievement and demonstrated leadership qualities.

For many years, STC Alberta provided small thank-you gifts to volunteers at our AGM. In 2001, the Administrative Council revisited this practice. Our volunteers made it very clear that they did not contribute to our community to obtain thank-you gifts and generously voted to redirect funds toward increasing the endowment of the Scholarship at Mount Royal. The Administrative Council set an annual contribution of \$1,000. That endowment now amounts to almost \$10,000. Only net investment returns are used to pay the scholarship, not the principal, and so the endowment generates an annual award that varies, but is always less than \$500.

In 2004, the Administrative Council voted to create awards for the Bachelor of Applied Communication in Professional Writing program at Grant MacEwan College in Edmonton comparable to those offered to Mount Royal. The first awards were presented, amid fanfare and excitement, at a celebration in February 2005.

Finally, in 2005, STC Alberta decide to create a second scholarship for Grant MacEwan student. The award amount for this scholarship (\$500) is identical to that of the Mount Royal scholarship, and the criteria are similar.

Criteria

Scholarship

The scholarship awards \$500 each to two students (one at Mount Royal and one at Grant MacEwan) who are nominated by the faculty of their respective schools and who meet the following criteria:

- Are registered as second-year, full-time students in their respective technical communication degree programs
- Are actively involved in student affairs or extracurricular activities
- Maintain a GPA of 3.00 or higher in the first semester of the year

Awards

Each award is a one-year student membership in STC and is given to the student with the highest GPA in the fall semester of his or her year in the technical communication degree program at his or her college. The student must be taking a full course load and must have a minimum GPA of 3.00.

A maximum of seven awards are handed out each year, with four awards going to Mount Royal students and three going to Grant MacEwan. The difference in the number of awards distributed to Mount Royal and Grant MacEwan is due to a difference in the structures of their technical communication degree programs.

Other Scholarships and Awards

Karen Lowe will present the journey one company took in this content-rich work world to battle information overload when creating user documentation.

CGI is a Canadian IT consulting firm, with over 25,000 people worldwide. To consistently deliver information to the end-users of their new production accounting application at the right time and in the right amount, they initiated a move to single-source their information using the DITA architecture. With planned reuse and a structured approach, they've created a comprehensive Help system.

Karen Lowe has been a technical writer for about 15 years. She started out in Toronto at one of the big banks and then moved to a company that created a health insurance adjudication system. Moving to Calgary, she worked for SMART Technologies until she succumbed to the lure of oil and gas. Although her interests are wide ranging, they don't include redoing something that she's already done. This led to her quest for reuse and working smarter not harder at CGI.

At present, Karen is a consultant at CGI, working on a production management system and leading the writing team on the production accounting team. Karen's presentation will trace the steps her team took to create better online help, moving from RoboHelp to an XML solution using the DITA architecture.

Come learn about CGI's decision to move to DITA, their approach, how they migrated their content, and some hints and tips that they stumbled on along the way.

Editors' Association of Canada (EAC)

Certification in Editing

The Editors' Association of Canada (EAC) offers professional certification, primarily for editors with at least two years experience. The certification tests cover four core editing areas outlined in EAC's Professional Editorial Standards:

- Elementary Knowledge of the Publishing Process
- Proofreading
- Copy Editing
- Structural and Stylistic Editing

Editors who pass all four tests within a 10-year period are awarded the designation Certified Professional Editor (CPE). Editors who pass two or more of the tests are awarded a limited designation, such as Certified in Copy Editing.

You can also become certified in one or more of the skill areas:

- proofreading
- copy editing
- structural and stylistic editing

The tests are open to EAC members and non-members (although non-members will pay a higher fee). You can order a certification study guide on [EAC's website](#).
